

# Human Trafficking Defined


(Victims of Trafficking and Violence Prevention Act of 2000)

The term "severe form of trafficking in persons" means:

(A) sex trafficking in which a commercial sex act is induced by force, fraud, or coercion, or in which the person induced to perform such act has not attained 18 years of age; or

(B) the recruitment, harboring, transportation, provision, or obtaining of a person for labor or services, through the use of force, fraud, or coercion for the purpose of subjection to involuntary servitude, peonage, debt bondage, or slavery.








What percentage of cases at Cast are sex trafficking, labor trafficking, or both?


#### Snapshot of victims accessing services

# Who Are Traffickers?

Anyone — individuals, professionals, recruiters, intimate partners, known persons to the victims, or strangers

### **Common Misconceptions**

# The Link Between Domestic Violence and Trafficking

"Human trafficking and domestic violence don't occur in silos – rather, there is a marked overlap in the pattern of behaviors that both abusers and traffickers use to exert power and control over a victim"

## Hummingbird Haven Emergency Shelter


Accommodates 15 beds to female identifying survivors

Short term emergency housing program (30-90 days)

# Learning from Housing Graduates

- Listening to survivors is critical for service referrals and case plans
  - Many HT survivors first ask for services from housing agencies and govt agencies and may be discouraged from not having their trafficking experience understood
  - HT-specific programs and services could help
- Social support needs to be part of case
  management plans, as part of current services and
  outside of services, as part of social support systems
  - Many survivors face stigma after their trafficking experience

# Learning from Housing Graduates

- Contact with law enforcement agencies may be re-traumatizing
- Services for survivors' children may be needed
- Economic support financial assistance, financial planning, and support on education and employment costs – helps a survivor maintain housing
- Many survivors struggle with their mental health (e.g. PTSD, bipolar disorder, depression)
- Many survivors are distrustful of others when they first escape their trafficking, and recreational activities help restore trust in others
- Housing case management should cover the whole healing process, including mental health, social support, and coping skills, along with recreational activities

## Housing Considerations for HT Survivors



When looking for shelter and permanent housing, survivors often need to avoid multiple areas, including areas where the traffickers frequent and sites of exploitation and residence



Trafficking is a violation of individual labor rights – many survivors do not have a source of income upon escaping



Many survivors cannot return to their families, out of fear of traffickers threatening their families or due to the trafficker being a family member

## Strategies for Identification

Incorporate simple questions into your intake process for potential survivors (particularly survivors of labor trafficking)

Build partnerships with agencies that serve survivors of human trafficking

Encourage human trafficking training for staff

Develop a protocol for referring identified survivors of human trafficking to appropriate agencies

Distribute information about how to recognize and report human trafficking in your community

# Strategies for Housing Programming

Ensure language accessibility for services (especially for foreign national survivors)

Review client rules/protocols for shelters and consider how this may replicate control tactics from traffickers

Design workshops that are specific to HT survivors

Build in social support systems into case management goals (particularly for foreign national survivors)

Allow for more time for housing navigation
