Federal Continuum of Care (CoC) DV Bonus

- CoC Program through the U.S. Department of Housing & Urban Development
- DV Bonus
 - Purpose: To provide survivor-specific housing/services and coordinated entry alignment/enhancements
 - Target Populations: survivors of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, stalking (Category 4 of HUD Homeless Definition)
 - human trafficking survivors <u>are eligible</u>
 - Funding is tied to CoC geography
 - LA CoC = all 88 cities in the county except Long Beach, Glendale, Pasadena
 - TODAY's conversation: Focused on funding for the LA CoC



CoC DV Bonus

2023 Bonus

- LA CoC likely to be eligible for up to \$5M
- HUD's FY23 NOFO will list eligible project types
- Likely to be the same as in prior years
 - Coordinated Entry (SSO-CE) for DV
 - Transitional Housing-Rapid Rehousing (TH-RRH) aka "Joint Component"
 - Standalone Rapid Rehousing (RRH)
- LA CoC <u>not likely</u> to be super competitive this year



Eligible Agency-Specific Projects (or multi-agency)

- Standalone Rapid Rehousing
 - Up to two years of rental assistance and services
- Transitional Housing-Rapid Rehousing (TH-RRH) aka "Joint Component"
 - Up to two years of services, any combination of services
- Operating period
 - Projects would start late 2024, with a 12-18 month initial grant term
 - Grants are renewable under the annual competition
- Funding amounts based on past local Requests for Proposals (RFPs):
 - Up to \$1.5 million per TH-RRH project
 - Up to \$1 million per RRH project



CoC DV Bonus – Process – What Typically Happens

HUD Releases Notice Funding Opportunity (NOFO)

- Typically, June/July each year
- 90-day turnaround time for submission

LAHSA Releases New Projects RFP

- Typically, 3-4 weeks after NOFO release
- 30 (or so) days for application submission



LA CoC Submits Consolidated Application to HUD

 HUD, not LAHSA, determines whether DV Bonus projects will be awarded to the LA CoC

Local RFP vs ITA (Intent to Apply)

DV Bonus – Pros and Cons of an ITA **Pros** Cons Lighter lift for LAHSA and for providers, allowing focus on other competition matters Bigger lift of RFP only required if funding is awarded by HUD (no "wasted effort") Better program designs and budgets May encourage a greater number of applicants, including those not YET qualified for LAHSA/CoC Program funding Gives LAHSA and its partners more time to line up housing and healthcare leveraging commitments >>> helps DV bonus project scoring



Local RFP vs ITA (cont'd)

DV Bonus – Pros and Cons of an ITA	
Pros	Cons
	Effectively eliminates the option of applying for any site-based projects TH-RRH
	Leaves only two viable project types (RRH and CES)
	Could harm the scoring competitiveness of RRH projects (but likely can be minimized) (HUD is supportive of an ITA)

Pro of ITA: Doing an RFP for DV Bonus but not for CoC Bonus, or vice-versa, would be confusing for the community.

Proposal for 2023 Coordinated Entry Project

What project would do

- Establish 2 FTE DV Matchers within CES
- Create Human Trafficking Regional Coordinators in each SPA
- Oversight/supervision of new system functions

Who would receive the funding

- Designated VSPs in each SPA most positions in budget
- LAHSA DV Matchers, HT System Coordinator, System Alignment Mgr

What project would cost

Estimated up to \$1.6M, leaving between \$3.4M for other project types



Option 2: FY 2023 Project Prioritization
Priorities with dollar caps
1. \$1 M in RRH Projects
2. \$2.5 M in <mark>CES</mark> Project
3. \$1.5 M in RRH Projects

Defining Project Types:

CoC Rapid Re-Housing



Program Design

Eligibility

- Survivors
 - Fleeing or attempting to flee
 - Head of Households over 18 years old
- 50% below Area Median Income
- NOTE: Transitional housing participants are NOT eligible for enrollment unless fleeing violence (different from Cal OES DV Housing First and Measure H funded RRH)

Length of Stay

- 24-month program stay
- Decision driven by client choice and specific circumstances

- Scattered Site
- Transition in place
- Landlord Engagement
- LeaseUp!

Financial Assistance

- Application fees
- Child care
- Education Services & Employment assistance
- Moving arrangements
- Transportation



Program Design | Rapid Re-Housing

Services

- Advocacy
- Assistance in locating and maintaining employment and gaining economic stability
- Case management
- Crisis/emergency support
- Help repairing credit and rental history
- Mental health counseling for the survivor and children
- Ongoing support with landlords to prevent evictions
- Substance abuse and/or mental health counseling
- Support and assistance with children and child custody related matters



Miscellaneous Considerations

Contract Term

- Typically 18 months for 1st term, 12 months thereafter
- Renewable on an annual basis
- FY23 Projects would start late 2024

Eligibility to Apply

- LAHSA RFSQ process
- Certification for the CoC Program

Budget Requirements

- 25% match of requested amount: cash or in-kind
- Reimbursement based contract



Match Considerations

Budgeting Options

- Eligible match activities: Rental Assistance (24 CFR 578.51); Supportive Services (24 CFR 578.53); and Project Administration
- Supportive Services
 - 1. Assessment of Service Needs
 - 2. Assistance with Moving Costs
 - 3. Case Management
 - 4. Child Care
 - 5. Education Services
 - 6. Employment Assistance
 - 7. Food
 - 8. Housing/Counseling Services
 - 9. Legal Services

- 10. Life Skills
- 11. Mental Health Services
- 12. Outpatient Health Services
- 13. Outreach Services
- 14. Substance Abuse Treatment Services
- 15. Transportation
- 16. Utility Deposits
- 17. Operating Costs (i.e., nonresidential program office)



Match Considerations

Budgeting Options

- Cash
 - Including funding for other programs (ex: Cal OES Housing First, private foundation dollars, etc.)
- In-kind
 - Leveraged existing position
 - Partnerships with organizations providing eligible services (legal services, counseling, childcare, employment)
 - Partnerships with housing organizations (FSCs, housing navigation providers, etc.)

Joint Component Program



Program Background

- Centers client choice
- Housing First Approach
- Combines Transitional Housing and Rapid Re-Housing



Program Eligibility & Design

Eligibility

- Survivors
 - Fleeing or attempting to flee
 - Head of Household over 18 years old
- 50% below Area Median Income

Length of Stay

- 24-month program stay (any combination of components)
- Decision driven by client choice and specific circumstances



Program Design | Transitional Housing

Transitional Housing Models

- Congregate vs. scattered-site
- Existing beds vs. new beds

Services

- Crisis/emergency support
- Obtaining protection orders
- Referrals to child custody related support
- Referrals to immigration support
- Referrals to legal support
- Relocation support
- Safety planning

Rapid Re-Housing

- Scattered Site
- Transition in place

Services

- Advocacy
- Assistance in locating and maintaining employment and gaining economic stability
- Help repairing credit and rental history
- Mental health counseling for the survivor and children
- Ongoing support with landlords to prevent evictions
- Support and assistance with children and child custody related matters



Program Design | Rapid Re-Housing (Cont.)

Allowable Costs

- Leasing Costs
- Operating Costs
- Rental Assistance
- Supportive Services

Flexible Funding

 Often used to maximize the impact of the program

Ineligible costs

- Mental Health
 Services
- Outpatient Health Services
- Outreach Services
- Substance abuse treatment service
